You guessed it, the first one is actually a picture of valves 1 + 2 being pressed down simultaneously. A fingering commonly known as 'bunny ears' because if you were to put those two fingers up behind the head of your friend, they would instantly turn into a convincing bunny rabbit.

Fact.


On a brass instrument you can play quite a lot of notes just by using the 'bunny ears' fingering and open valves.

How many notes do you think you can play on bunny ears (1+2) and open?

Let's see if we can create a 'Bunny Ears' tune together...


TOP TIP! Before you start, buzz your lips to get them warm, make sure you are sitting up straight, and take a nice big breath to make sure you sound great! I can play _____ notes on bunny ears and _____ notes on open valves. Get me!

When you see a \bigcirc play a note with no valves down, doesn't matter which, you choose! When you see a $\stackrel{\frown}{\longrightarrow}$ play a note with 1+2 down, a 'bunny ears' note. When you see an empty box take a rest!
